## French

Many exciting opportunities are available at NMU for students studying French. . While on campus, students can join the French Club, All Nations Club, or take part in department-sponsored events. But why limit yourself to campus? You can study abroad in France, Morocco, or another country in the Francophone world. French majors are strongly encouraged to complete a pre-approved study, internship, or work experience in a French-speaking country. Courses taken abroad can count toward the major, with departmental approval. The Bachelor's in French is an interdisciplinary major that encompasses the richness of the French and Francophone world and offers an intellectually diverse program that includes literature, culture, film, art, and philosophy. French courses fulfill a number of General Education requirements. A student can earn a second major in French with only 36 credits, which is a useful addition to any major at NMU. Double majoring in French provides a solid portfolio fornational and international careers as well as for graduate studies.

# Additional Considerations

Many French majors also double-major. Some popular major pairings include Biology and Environmental Studies (especially for students who wish to complete field work in the Caribbean or French-speaking Africa), English (especially for students interested in graduate school or who want to study literature in the original language), International Studies (especially for students who plan to study abroad in a French-speaking country), just to name a few.

# **Career Development**

You should begin the resume-building process as soon as you can. The Academic and Career Advisement Center can assist you with career planning, while Career Services will help you fine tune your resume and cover letter. In the meantime, we highly recommend that you study abroad. A study abroad experience stands out to future employers because it demonstrates your adaptability and ability to engage with people from diverse backgrounds. A professionally-related internship, membership in the French Club (and/or serving as an officer of the club), and work as a French tutor in the Language Resource Center are is a ways to develop your skills, gain experience, and enhance your resume. Your academic course work is important as well, so be sure to maintain a high grade point average.

# Skills and Competencies

The multinational tech firm Google surveyed its work force and many of the top characteristics of Google employees are skills acquired in the French language, literature, and culture classrooms. Those abilities include:

- 1. Being a good coach, having empathy, and being supportive.
- 2. Communicating and listening well.
- 3. Possessing insights into others (including others' different values and points of view).
- 4. Being a good critical thinker and problem solver.
- $5. \ Being \ able \ to \ make \ connections \ across \ complex \ ideas.$

The French Program at NMU emphasizes aptitude in cultural diversity, communication, critical thinking, reading, and writing, thus providing students with marketable and practical skills regardless of career path. Students learn to gauge nuanced cultural differences and to communicate effectively with people of different backgrounds, making them ready to navigate today's diverse professional environments. Students develop critical thinking, leading them to approach difficult and abstract challenges with creativity and confidence. Unlike most other specialties, students in the French program learn about international customs, attitudes, politics, history, world views and artistic contributions of French and Francophone people in 28 countries across 5 continents.

French is a global language, the second most frequently taught language in the world next to English. Along with English, French is the official working language in the United Nations, International Labor Bureau, International Olympic Committee, Council of Europe, European Community, Universal Postal Union, International Red Cross, Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD), UNESCO, and NATO. French is the dominant working language at the European Court of Justice, European Tribunal of First Instance, and Press Room at the European Commission in Brussels, Belgium.
