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Cody Boyer, a recent CAPS graduate, has gone on to work at CNN in Atlanta.


The correspondent/reporter position he assumed in their newsroom is the very same one that Anderson Cooper had.

While here at NMU, Cody was a very involved student. Majoring in English writing and media production new technology with a minor in communication studies Boyer worked on campus as sports editor of *The North Wind* and as a producer and anchorman for Pub-

lic Eye News (PEN). He worked cameras for both PEN and the Central Collegiate Hockey Association as a student ambassador and ran technical and audio boards for multiple shows at WMNU-TV 13. He also worked at Radio X as a disc jockey and served during his senior year as the editor-inchief of *The North Wind*.

According to Boyer, "the main thing I really learned in both PEN and at *The North Wind* was how to bring the news to the audience and knowing what they were really looking





for and what really needed to be heard."

He said he feels that this opportunity with CNN was just "a really awesome example of how a person can find good fortune by sticking to their guns."

Rebecca Budesky, a communication studies major at the time, travelled to Washington, D.C. in November with Jim Cantrill, our department head, to participate in the National Communication Association (NCA) convention.

numerous other sessions at the conference, including a half- day field trip to learn about Environmental Communication. There she was able to network with government officials and representatives from numerous NGO's in regard to environmental policy and communication in the U.S.

NMU Professor Gets a Grip on Professional Filmmaking

A faculty member from NMU's Communication and Performance Studies Department spent three weeks in Nashville this spring getting an inside view of movie making with writer/director Howie Klausner ("Space Cowboys," "Soul Surfer") and actor Kevin Sorbo (star of the "Hercules" TV series). Dr. Mark Shevy, an associate professor of mass communication and media production, worked with the grip crew on a film called "The Secret Handshake."

"Nothing compares to the perspective you get by doing the actual work and living day in and day out as part of the crew," said Shevy. "I learned new skills, gained insight on the overall process of filmmaking, and made a good number of friends."

Shevy said the film was fairly low-budget, only about \$300,000, which allowed a more casual atmosphere than in a film that has \$100 million riding on it. This provided ample opportunities to chat with the cast and crew, which includes notable professionals.

"I was repeatedly surprised by the caliber of people with whom I was working," said Shevy. "The writer/director worked extensively with Clint Eastwood. The lead actor has been the star of a hit TV series and a growing list of movies, one of which was in theaters this spring. The unit production manager was a coordinator for 2013's acclaimed film "42." Many of the crew members are currently working for the TV series "Nashville."

Shevy said he tried to put himself in the shoes of the students doing internships.

"I worked hard, as though my future job depended upon it, and I guess I still have what it takes," laughed Shevy. "Several people told me that they hope to work with me again and that they'll give a great recommendation if I ever want to get a job in the film or television industry."

The experience confirmed for Shevy that internships and other real-world experiences are vital for many students.

"I told people that our broadcasting majors are required to have internships, and they emphatically said, 'That's so important,'" said Shevy. A good internship allows students to see what the job is really like, teaches details that can't be taught in a classroom and develops skills and career networking necessary for getting your foot in the door for a job."

The film is a joint venture between professionals in the movie industry and a new graduate program in filmmaking at Lipscomb University. "The university desired to incorporate a full-scale project with experienced professionals, and the film producers needed extra crew members and resources to augment the film's budget. The collaboration was a win-win solution," said Shevy.

"We've done similar collaborations at NMU, such as involving students in professional television sports and radio broadcasts," said Shevy. "Since the film shoot, I've been thinking about ways we might be able to do even more."

"The Secret Handshake" is a family comedy about a father who has a daughter being harassed by a trouble-making boy. In an attempt to help the boy develop better character and maturity, the dad takes the boy camping, where they have mishaps, laughs, adventure, and some thoughtful reflection.

"The experience was also personally rewarding, because it is the kind of movie that I want to see with my family," said Shevy.

Producers for "The Secret Handshake" are pursuing network television and other distribution deals. The film is scheduled to be released this fall.

Campus Involvement Helps Land Jobs

Many students join student organizations not realizing the impact they can have on their college career and beyond. NMU alumnus Will Burns, who graduated with a degree in communication studies in 2013, said getting involved beyond the classroom helps more than one might think.

At the time of this article, Burns was an anchor and reporter for ABC 10 WBUP in Ishpeming, Mich., and the managing editor for cover 32 Detroit, an ongoing NFL news website that Burns said covers everything from game reviews, game previews, analysis and other news.

Burns said he attributes his current jobs to the student organizations he was involved in during his time at NMU. "I haven't even been writing journalism for a year yet and I'm a paid journalist. All three, Public Eye News, Radio X and The North Wind, collectively really started my career. Without that experience, I wouldn't have



the raw skillset to start my career in journalism and media production.

Today, Burns is working for Eagle Radio in Marquette. He is an account executive and sports announcer there for Northern Michigan University and Marquette Senior High School athletics.



Junior Mikenzie Frost divides her time between being a resident advisor, president of the NMU Figure Skating Team and volunteering at Public Eye News, all while pursuing a degree in multimedia journalism, with a double-minor in criminal justice and art and design.

While Frost's favorite classes this semester are intro to multimedia journalism and sports and special events programming, her favorite experience right now is the time she spends at Public Eye News. "I love getting the hands-on experience in the field, and learning all the things that it takes to produce a news broadcast," she says.

When Frost isn't in class or down at Public Eye News, a large majority of her time

is devoted to figure skating. After her mom put her in Learn to Skate lessons at age 4 in hopes of Frost playing hockey, she has rarely left the ice since. "Once I saw the girls doing jumps and spins, I told them I didn't want to play hockey, I wanted to figure skate," she says.

Frost has been competing since age 7, and has been in roughly 95 competitions in the past 11 years. These competitions have ranged from being Michigan based, to most recently, the Nations Cup in Spain. When at home, she finds herself back at the rink as a Learn To Skate coach as well as a private coach, teaching other asspiring young skaters.

Though being the president of the NMU Figure Skating Team has its stressful moments, Frost loves it. Her job requirements include recruitment, organization of the team, registering, and entering the team in competitions, choreography, and organizing appearances to name a few.

Ultimately, Frost hopes to be a news anchor on a national news network. Her dream stems from her childhood, when her mom would turn the news on at night while she did homework. Even then, Frost thought they had the best job in the world.

"They (anchors) are the people that families trust to get their news; they trust them and allow them in their homes," she says.

She thinks her experiences in and outside of class will help set her apart from other prospective applicants. Her advice to other students is "to get involved as much as possible, and don't be afraid to go out in the field to find stories. Also, make as many connections as you can!"



CAPS Department Receives New Production Mac Lab

According to CAPS department head James Cantrill, the new lab grew out of the needs highlighted by the academic program review process.

"The review, among other things, indicated that right now our students in broadcast production and public relations are hampered by the fact that we're limited to the PC platform of the Lenovo Thinkpad, whereas the industry standard is a Macintosh operating system," Cantrill said.

"The Mac lab is a response to requests

we've made for a long time to get a computer platform that was more useful to the production students. Many of our students require Macs for running software such a Protools or Final Cut Pro, and we haven't had much of that capability in the past," Shevy said.

"The new lab will have 17 work stations, all hooked up to a server, and all the software needed for production work," Cantrill said. "There will also be a high-end dual-screen ed-

iting suite in the room and an instructor station with an iMac, large LCD screen for viewing, editing and discussion in class."

The new lab will be located in room 318 of the Thomas Fine Arts Building. Cantrill anticipates the lab will be finished for the Fall 2014 semester.

"We owe this facility to the Provost Paul Lang, and especially Michael Broadway for leading this project," Cantrill said.



"Les Miserables" Came to the Forest Roberts Theatre Main stage

Keeping it under wraps for most of last summer, Ansley Valentine, director of the Forest Roberts Theatre (FRT) and of this show said that he "believed that this play would be the highlight of the program this year," and he was right.

"This was the first time that the rights to the full production of the play were made available and they were only made available for a limited time, so we decided it was probably best for us to seize the opportunity to

Truckey said he was "excited to play Jean Valjean as he was an inspirational character." Valentine said that "bringing Truckey's experience and talent into the show was something worth seeing."

When NMU senior theatre major York Griffin first discovered "A Kind of Alaska," he wasn't anywhere near the Upper Peninsula or Alaska.

In fact, he was attending the School of Steppenwolf, a residency created by Chicago's famed Steppenwolf Theatre Company.

"There were a couple girls there who were working on a scene from it," Griffith said. "I thought it was really fascinating, and it's kind of stuck with me ever since then."

After a 15-year hiatus, Griffith returned to NMU in fall 2013 to earn his bachelor's degree and chose to direct "A Kind of Alaska" as

his capstone project.

"A Kind of Alaska"

Written by Nobel-winning

playwright Harold Pinter,
"Alaska" tells the story of Deborah, a middle-aged woman
who had been in a coma for
the past three decades. Over
the course of the play's single
act, Deborah tries to come to
terms with a world that's radically different from the one
she remembers.

"One thing that often happens with shorter plays is that they tend to rely on archetypal or stereotypical characters,"

Griffith said. "Thanks to Harold Pinter's writing, this play is far from that."

While Griffith was the play's director, the creative process was one of collaboration. Instead of making every artistic decision for the production before rehearsals began, he and the play's cast would work together to determine its creative direction.

"It's one of the best short plays ever written by one of the most important playwrights of the last 50 years." Griffith said. "I think it was a rare opportunity to see a very important play that isn't performed often or done well."

The Black Box Gets a Facelift

Audiences for the recent Comedy of Errors production were the first to experience the new seating in the James A. Panowski Black Box Theatre.

Ergonomically designed, padded theatre seats—complete with armrests—have replaced the folding chairs that once surrounded the stage.

According to Ansley Valentine, Director of Theatre, "it's nice because you walk in now and it looks like a real theatre." Before "the folding chairs weren't all that comfortable and some older patrons couldn't manage to sit for an entire production. That stopped them from attending shows in the black

box," he said. "It was also becoming a safety issue. By fire code, chairs have to be locked together in groups. The folding chairs were worn out and damaged enough over time that they didn't lock the way they should. So, through the good graces of our dean, we were able to secure the necessary fund-

"Overall, the chairs in their encore appearance seemed to be a hit," said Valentine
