
ANNOUNCEMENTS

NMU/Marquette County's One Book, **One Community** novel for this year is Aleksandar Hemon's *The Lazarus Project*. Hemon will be visiting NMU on Tuesday, November 15 at 7 p.m. in the Great Lakes Rooms of the University Center. A summary of the book follows: On March 2, 1908 Lazarus Averbuch, a Jewish immigrant from Eastern Europe to Chicago, is shot by the chief of the Chicago police while delivering an important letter. Shippy then accuses Averbuch of being an anarchist assassin and agent of foreign political operatives, causing the city and country to panic. In the 21st century, Brik, also a native of Eastern Europe and a writer, becomes obsessed with Lazarus's story and, in an effort to understand, Brik and his friend Rora retrace Averbuch's path across Eastern Europe.

A public lecture and discussion on the Balkans with NMU professor Chet Defonso will occur on October 10 at 7 p.m. in the Peter White Library. The film *Witness* followed by a discussion led by NMU professor Robbie Goodrich will occur on Oct 11 at 7 p.m. at PWPL. An evening of art, music, dance, literature, and drama related to *The Lazarus Project* will occur on November 17 at 7:30 p.m. in the NMU Reynolds Recital Hall. All are welcome to attend.

Aimee Nez is the author of three books of poetry. *Lucky Fish*, her latest tile, won the gold medal in Poetry from the Independent Publisher Book Awards and the Eric Hoffer Grand Prize for Independent Books. *At the Drive-In Volcano*, her second book, won the Balcones Prize. *Miracle Fruit*, her first book, won the Tupelo Press Prize, ForeWord Magazine's Book of the Year Award, and the Global Filipino Award. Recent honors include a poetry fellowship from the National Endowment for the Arts and a Pushcart Prize. Nez is associate professor of English at State University of New York-Fredonia, where she teaches creative writing and environmental literature. The reading is scheduled for 7:30 p.m., Tuesday, October 4, in the Michigan Room of the University Center. This reading is free and open to the public.


Accomplishments

Accomplishments



This summer, Beverly Matherne engaged in whirlwind travels in France, Wales, and the UP Michigan.

Since her return from Paris, Beverly has translated thirteen pages from Jean-Luc Steinmetz's new book, *Le Dépositaire et Autre Poèmes* (Le Castor Astral: 2011). On the basis of this work, Steinmetz has named Beverly his official American translator.

In France, Wales, and the UP, she did a total of nineteen readings and poetry events. In France, she performed blues poetry at Shakespeare & Company in Paris and visited with

owner George Whitman; did a workshop and reading as *Invitée d'Honneur* at *Le Lycée François Mitterrand* in Moissac; read in the poetry reading series at *La Bibliothèque de Moissac*; did two readings at the Écoforum, held in Saint-Nicolas-de-la-Grave, native village of Lamothe-Cadillac, an invitation motivated by her recent book on the French explorer, containing carefully researched eco-systems from the age of Louis XIV; did a half-hour interview and performance on *Radio d'Oc* that aired fifteen times to publicize her readings in the area and to express the French obsession with Cajun music, blues, and jazz.

While in France, she also traveled to Aix-en-Provence, where she attended the international CIEF (*Conseil International d'Études Francophones*) conference.

In Wales, Beverly did a multitude of readings including one at the Nick Holly Art Studio, in Swansea, in honor of the "40th Anniversary Celebration" of publisher Cross-Cultural Communications.

In the UP, she did readings and served on panels on writing and publishing at Peter White Library in Marquette, Lighthouse Christian Bookstore in Marquette, Carnegie Public Library in Ishpeming, Country Village Bookstore in Ishpeming, Portage Lake District Library in Houghton, Northwind Books in Hancock, and L'Anse United Methodist Church Fellowship.
