He also wrote the cover article for the March 1 issue of the Sunday Travel Section in *The Oregonian*, the daily newspaper of Portland, Oregon. McCommons is currently working on a non-fiction book, *Waiting on a Train: Anticipating the Revival of the American Passenger Rail System*. He has also been interviewed by journalists working on articles about passenger rail for *Metropolitan Magazine*, *Good Magazine*, *Next American City, The Congressional Monthly*, and *The Associated Press*. McCommons has received a faculty grant for 2009-2010 to do further rail research.


Lisa Fay Coutley's poetry appeared in the December issue of The Pedestal Magazine and will also be featured in the spring issue of Clackamas Literary Review.
