Course Description

CS 101 is a comprehensive introduction to implementing web sites using HTML and CSS. Students will learn to design and develop web sites that contain inter-linked web pages from scratch. The class begins with HTML, and continues to teach CSS which is used to format and style web pages. Toward the end of the course, students will learn how to use JavaScript to create web pages that are dynamic and interactive.

Characteristics of a communication system include: 1) possession of a grammar; 2) operation from an established set of rules; 3) reasoning properties such as deduction, inference drawing and problem solving. This includes courses in languages and those in which the central focus of the course is on statistics, computers or formal logic.
